What3words provides an accurate location for Emergency Services to locate a person or property by dividing the world into 3 metre by 3 metre squares and allocating 3 words to each square. Words are easier to relay to emergency services than latitude and longitude and there is less likelihood of error. You do not need a mobile connection to obtain your location, but you do to relay your 3 words to emergency services.

The officer issuing your permit will explain its conditions including that you must give a minimum of 24 hours notice before lighting a fire to:

1. Your Neighbours, including the NPWS if next door to you
2. Register your burns at <https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/fire-information/fire-permits/burn-notifications>. No internet, then register your burns via the Permit Line02 6575 1212

No fires in the open during a Total Fire Ban. You will be fined. If you intend to have a fire during April to the end of August, you don't need a permit but you still need to give a minimum of 24hrs notice, refer to above points.

Putty Hub Houses

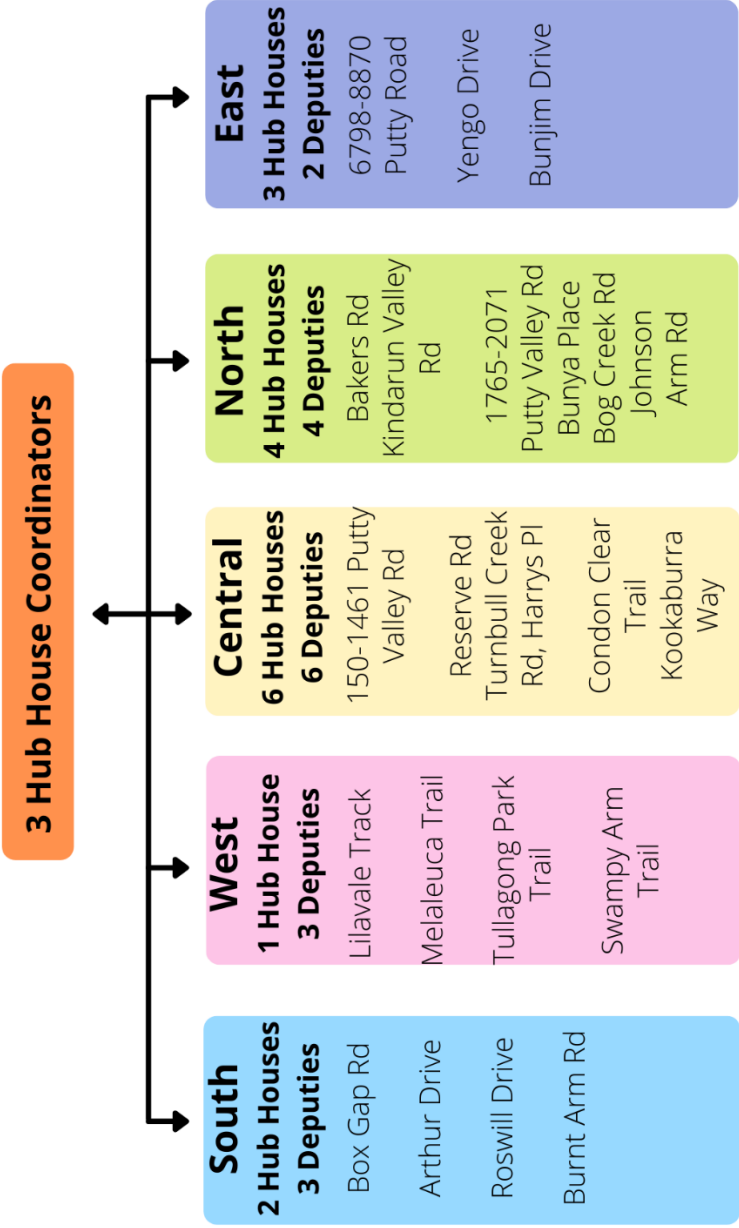
The Putty Hub House system is a communications tree activated when a fire, flood or storm threatens the area. Hub House Coordinators, who are in touch with emergency services, first notify the community by email and ensure information is posted to Putty Valley Chronicles on Facebook.

If residents and landowners need to take action the full Hub House system is activated. Hub House Leaders contact the landholders in their area, keeping them updated during the emergency.

POWER FAILURES

Power failures frequently occur during emergencies in Putty. Both the mobile tower and the landline telephone exchange will only work for two days without mains power.

To conserve fuel and keep fridges, freezers and drinking water pumps going, run your generator for 2 hours morning and evening. If you have a satellite connection and a mobile with WiFi calling (see below) you can make phone calls at this time too.

COMMUNICATIONS

A satellite internet connection with generators or solar power will keep you connected during power failures.

Enable Telstra WiFi Calling and SMS, or a similar service on your mobile to make and receive calls and SMS through your satellite internet connection. Check if your mobile is compatible.

If people are unable to contact you during a power failure check with your Hub House Leader where you can make a call if needed.

Putty Hall has a free satellite connection where you can use WiFi Calling and SMS if the power is on there.

Putty Road is maintained by Transport for NSW. During an emergency it may be closed due to flooding, fire or to prevent theft. Always carry in your car proof of residency or land ownership. After an event the road may be closed because of damage or landslides. Transport for NSW - 24 hour traffic enquiry line 13 1500

- Putty Valley Road
- Johnsons Arm Road
- Box Gap Road up until the end of the bitumen
- The initial part of the Lilavale Track
- Burnt Arm Road

Advice (Yellow):

An incident has started. There is no immediate danger. Stay up to date in case the situation changes.

Watch and Act (Orange):

There is a heightened level of threat. Conditions are changing and you need to start taking action now to protect you and your family.

Emergency Warning (Red):

An Emergency Warning is the highest level of warning. You may be in danger and need to take action immediately. Any delay now puts your life at risk.

GRAB AND GO BAG CHECK LIST

- ☐ Mobile phone and portable solar charger
- ☐ Laptop and/or USB memory stick containing vital information
- ☐ Portable radio with spare batteries
- ☐ Torch with spare batteries
- ☐ First aid kit
- ☐ Candles and matches
- ☐ Drinking water
- ☐ Emergency contact list
- ☐ Copy of your emergency plans
- ☐ A waterproof bag for valuables and mementos
- ☐ Important documents (e.g. passports, wills, driver's licence, marriage and birth certificates, land titles, mortgage papers, insurance papers, medications list)
- ☐ Food and dietary requirements
- ☐ Medications list with reminder tag to pack medications (allow 3-day supply of medications, including prescriptions)
- ☐ 3-day supply of appropriate clothing and footwear
- ☐ Personal care items
- ☐ Blankets/sleeping bags
- ☐ Spare keys for home and cars
- ☐ Cash and credit cards
- ☐ Any other items

Don't forget your pets

- ☐ Collar with ID tag, harness, leash, travel crate, bedding
- ☐ Bowls, food and medication for 7 days
- ☐ Litter tray, poo bags
- ☐ Registration and vaccine documents

BUSHFIRE

Remember it is your responsibility to prepare your property, not volunteer fires and hub house leaders. Don't leave it to the last minute. If you have made no effort, do not expect them to put themselves at risk to defend it.

In extreme or catastrophic conditions, hub house leaders may choose or be forced to leave the area. If most of the state is on fire, RFS resources will be located where they can save thousands of homes. Be nice to your neighbours - they may be the ones to save your property.

PREPARE FOR ALL EMERGENCIES

Things to do all year

- ☐ Check radio and torch batteries every 6 months
- ☐ Electronically scan your important documents/photos on USB stick, saves space and are easy to take with you
- ☐ Store emergency phone numbers and apps on your phone
- ☐ Maintain adequate levels of home and contents insurance.
Date to renew.....

Essential fire protection for your home

- ☐ Block areas where embers can enter the house (external walls, windows, doors)
- ☐ Install metal fly screens on all windows and doors
- ☐ Install metal gutter guards
- ☐ Install a fire sprinkler system on roof to flood gutters and cool roof
- ☐ Enclose areas under the house
- ☐ Remove flammable mulch, vegetation in garden beds away from the house.
- ☐ Replace wood fences close to your home or sheds with metal fences
- ☐ Use stones in your garden instead of mulch

- ❑ If you have a pool, tank or dam, put a Static Water Supply (SWS) sign on your property entrance and ensure it's visible to passing fire trucks. Contact Kenn Mackett 0401 535 575 for signs
- ❑ Position gas cylinders on side of house and away from trees and gardens, direct any pressure release valves away from house
- ❑ Place water pipes from dams underground and install a pump to the house

Smoke Alarms

- ❑ Test once a month by pressing the test button until the alarm sounds
- ❑ Clean with vacuum cleaner every 6 months to remove dust
- ❑ Change batteries once a year (unless it is a long-life battery-powered alarm)
- ❑ Replace the whole unit in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations, typically after 10 years.

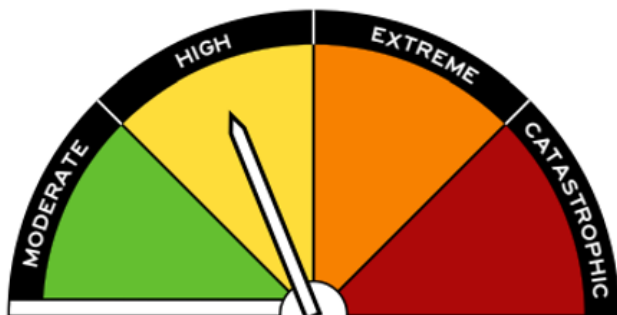
Fire season preparation – August/September

- ☐ Remove any metal objects which can create a spark when hit by a mower or slasher. If you hit something check that a fire hasn't started.

A well prepared home is more likely to survive a bushfire.

- ☐ Complete (or review) your Bush Fire Survival Plan
- ☐ Trim trees and branches that could potentially fall on your home
- ☐ Mow your lawns short and keep gardens well maintained. Remove the cuttings
- ☐ Remove material that can burn around your home - wood piles, mulch piles
- ☐ Clean your gutters, downpipes and drains regularly. Burning embers can set your house on fire
- ☐ Ensure you have enough hoses with spray nozzles to reach all around your house
- ☐ Check pumps are working and fuelled up
- ☐ Check generator works and is fuelled up
- ☐ Mow vegetation near your power supply pole and under your power lines
- ☐ Ensure a fire tanker can access your property
- ☐ Clear fire breaks

MODERATE Plan and prepare

Review your bush fire survival plan with your family. Keep yourself informed and monitor conditions. Be ready to act if necessary.

HIGH Be ready to act

Leaving early is the safest option for your survival. Well prepared homes that are actively defended can provide safety – but only stay if you are physically and mentally prepared to defend in these conditions. If you're not prepared, leave early in the day.

EXTREME Take action now to protect life and property

Leaving early is the safest option for your survival. If you are not prepared to the highest level, leave early in the day. Only consider staying if you are prepared to the highest level – such as your home is specially designed, constructed or modified, and situated to withstand a fire, you are well prepared and can actively defend it if a fire starts.

CATASTROPHIC For your survival, leave bushfire risk areas

Leaving early is the only option. Leave bush fire prone areas the night before or early in the day – do not just wait and see what happens. Make a decision about when you will leave, where you will go, how you will get there and when you will return. Homes are not designed to withstand fires in catastrophic conditions so you should leave early.

Fire Alert Actions

- ☐ Check you have done your fire season preparation as above
- ☐ Wear cotton long sleeve top, cotton long pants, leather boots, leather gloves, hat, goggles, sunscreen and mask when outside.
- ☐ Ensure tanks are full and connected to pumps
- ☐ Connect hoses
- ☐ Fill drinking water containers. Need 3 litres per person per day. During a power failure your house pressure pump won't run
- ☐ Disconnect drinking water tank to avoid ash being washed into the tank. Reconnect after first rain has washed ash from roof and gutters.
- ☐ Remove material that can burn around your home eg door mats, outdoor furniture, leaves, twigs and other debris
- ☐ Turn off gas cylinders, remove away from house and direct any pressure release valves away from house
- ☐ Remove flammable liquids away from buildings to protected areas
- ☐ Secure or put away items that could blow around in strong winds
- ☐ Do you have enough gas, fuel, provisions and medications for at least 2 weeks? Fuel additive for longer storage
- ☐ Arrange to relocate your horses
- ☐ Open your paddock gates so stock can move freely around your property
- ☐ Unlock your gate to give fire truck access

FLOOD

During a flood Putty's bridges usually go underwater. Roads often follow creeks and are therefore impassable during a flood and after they may need repairs or be washed away. You could be stuck in Putty for over a week or longer, depending on where you live.

Hawkesbury Catchment

Putty Creek and Long Weeney Creek flow into Wollemi Creek, then into the Colo River <https://coloriver.com.au/>. The Colo meets the Hawkesbury River at Lower Portland and flows out to sea at Broken Bay.

Boggy Swamp and Toolee Creeks are located near Yengo Drive. They join up to the east and eventually flow into the MacDonald River, meeting the Hawkesbury River at Wisemans Ferry. The MacDonald River starts at Kindarun. See catchment map page 8.

Prepare

- ☐ Clean out road drainage to avoid roads being washed out
- ☐ Clean gutters and drainage around house
- ☐ Move animals to higher ground
- ☐ Managing erosion before and after floods

Act

- ☐ Never enter or attempt to drive through flood water – there are many hidden dangers
- ☐ Beware of landslides and trees falling in areas where the soil is very wet, particularly when a strong wind is blowing
- ☐ Carry a shovel and chainsaw in your vehicle

SEVERE STORM

Severe storms may include lightning, high winds and/or hail.

‘Dry’ electrical storms can start a fire, which can rapidly turn into a dangerous bushfire, especially in strong winds.

Prepare

- ☐ Secure or put away items that could blow around. Flying objects can be lethal in strong winds
- ☐ Trim trees and branches near your home

Act

- ☐ Stay indoors. Beware of trees falling over in areas where the soil is very wet. The apple gum, a common tree at Putty, is known as the widow maker because its branches frequently fall
- ☐ Know the best shelter in your home, such as a bathroom on the ground floor
- ☐ Stay clear of windows and glass doors
- ☐ Disconnect all appliances during an electrical storm
- ☐ If the building starts to break up, protect yourself with a rug, blanket, mattress or shelter under a bench or table.
- ☐ If outside, find cover away from the wind and protect your head.
- ☐ If inside a vehicle, park away from trees and power lines and ensure the hand brake is on. Keep your face away from windows.
- ☐ Look for smoke or fire after an electrical storm

HEATWAVE

Extreme heat conditions can also cause power failures so unless you have a generator or solar power keeping cool will be difficult. Wet a few towels, keep them cool and place over people with heat stress.

Prepare

- ☐ Check fans and air-conditioner – clean AC filter
- ☐ Make cool packs and ice cubes
- ☐ Protect windows from direct sunlight with blinds or curtains
- ☐ See also Fire Season Preparation – August/ September on page 19.

Act

- ☐ Watch for signs of heat stress – headache, nausea, dizziness, thirst, fainting.
- ☐ Drink plenty of cool water
- ☐ Wear loose fitting clothing and a hat if going outside
- ☐ Stay indoors during the middle of the day
- ☐ Have a cool shower
- ☐ Close doors and windows and draw curtains and blinds
- ☐ Use air-conditioning

Biosecurity Emergencies – see current situation

If you decide to stay, are you fit enough physically and mentally to be able to keep your family, pets, animals and property safe?

Notify your Hub House Leader or neighbour if you are leaving or staying in Putty. In severe fire conditions, our firefighters need to know if someone is in a dwelling.

Assets can be replaced, people cannot.
